

CROATIA The Dalmatian Flotilla

Cruise along the beautiful Dalmatian coast and islands of Croatia which are full of character, steeped in history and magnificent scenery.

Kastela

This marina is our flotilla base, situated midway between Trogir and Split. Only 15-20 minutes from Split Airport by road, it's an ideal starting point for your sailing holiday.

Milna

Milna is a pretty port, with harbour front cafes and a restaurant overlooking the grand Venetian houses, built from white marble and local stone. A rocky beach can be found up along the bay.

Trogir

A UNESCO World Heritage Site since 1997 with the best preserved Gothic/Romanesque town in Central Europe. Explore the tiny streets full of restaurants and bars, which lead back to the Main Square and Cathedral. For spectacular views climb the clock tower or castle, or cross the bridge to explore the colourful and vibrant day market.

Hvar

Hvar is undeniably beautiful; its picturesque and historic town is well worth a visit. In the springtime the air is fragrant with lavender, which covers a vast amount of the island and surely finds its way into a number of the souvenir shops. The harbour is always busy, so it's best to moor at Palmizana in the Pakleni Islands and take the water taxi over to Hvar. Palmizana also has a number of beaches and a wonderful restaurant set in its own enchanting garden, which overlooks the bay.



Vis

Sail to this unspoilt island with its many spectacular bays and inlets to explore. The town itself has a lively seafront with a wide choice of restaurants, each offering a variety of both local and Italian influenced dishes. Alternatively moor in the lovely fishing port of Komiza where you can enjoy dinner in the Jastozera – famous for its lobster and its unique setting. You can also take an excursion to the famous blue caves of Bisevo.

Stomorska

A beautiful, tranquil fishing harbour on the island of Solta in its own secluded bay. Enjoy a leisurely swim off the beach and take in the lovely view across to the mainland before dining in one of the quayside restaurants on wonderful seafood.



Zlarin

Visit the museum displaying an array of corals found in the region and a limited selection of shops selling the locally made jewellery made from coral, which the islanders have dived for, for many years as a tradition.

Korcula

The Island is famous for its wine, olives, forests and maritime tradition. Korcula town is said to be the birthplace of the famous explorer Marco Polo, who brought coined money and pasta to Europe from China! The lovely old town with its ancient buildings is enclosed by a fortified wall. Although only four of the original seven towers remain, a walk along the city wall remains a treat.

Mljet

This unspoilt island with its two spectacular salt water lakes is now a national park. It is reputed that St Paul was shipwrecked here on his way to Rome in AD61, and before that Odysseus too on his way back from the Trojan War. Hopefully, with the benefit of our more modern yachts, the same fate will not befall you on your holiday!

Lastovo

“Amidst the string of silvery islets, in the Adriatic Sea, stands the island of Lastovo, an amazing beautiful island, which from the outside, appears to be a forgotten companion to history” wrote George Bernard Shaw about this unspoilt destination. Enjoy its untouched bays and the tranquillity of this special place.

Dubrovnik

The “Pearl of the Adriatic” is situated on the southern Dalmatian Coast. The fortified City Walls circle a perfectly preserved complex of buildings and streets. Founded in the 7th Century, Dubrovnik grew to be a powerful trading Republic to rival the Venetians. Perfectly restored after the Yugoslav wars, Dubrovnik is one of Croatia's most spectacular sights.
